Your Horse, Your Veterinarian and an Active Spring

If you are planning to enter your horse this competition season it is time to gear up. To achieve maximum performance, as your veterinarian, there are several things I provide to aid you and your horse. From routine care to medical management within the limits of the rules, all of the following should be considered.

Before You Start Competition

Floating Teeth

Floating your horse's teeth is important. In addition to allowing your horse to get maximal nutritional value from the food he eats, performance dental floating can help increase your horse's response to the bit. One very common finding on floating is hooks in the back of the mouth. Whether you are doing reining, hunter/jumper, dressage or other equestrian athletics asking a horse to "come on the bit" by flexing his poll and relaxing his jaw is important. It is difficult for your horse to come on the bit with hooks in the back of his mouth because in flexing at the poll the lower jaw slides forward. These hooks can grab the upper row of teeth blocking the ability of the jaw to slide forward or causing your horse to have to open his mouth to do so. It is important to have a veterinarian float your horse's teeth for several reasons. Periodically I am asked to check a horse that has been floated by a non-veterinarian. The skill demonstrated ranges considerably. Unfortunately there is no licensure for people who call themselves horse dentists. You could decide to be one tomorrow and start representing yourself as such. On the other hand as a veterinarian, I have a graduate degree, a state license to perform veterinary procedures, have trained myself to do so and performed hundreds of procedures. There is a reason I limit myself to floating four horses in a day. In contrast I see some "horse dentists" floating 8 or 10 horses in a day. It takes over an hour, start to finish, to do a thorough treatment and it is rigorous work when done correctly even with the power dental instruments currently available.

Vaccinations

Equine Herpes Virus Myeloencephalopathy has made extra attention to vaccines important in California. There has been a small number of horses affected at several different locations by Equine Herpes Virus Myeloencephalopathy over the past 6 months. This is a condition where severe neurological signs occur. As opposed to last year's outbreak, the most recent cases dating back several months appear to be caused by the common non-neuropathogenic strain of Equine Herpesvirus -1 (EHV-1). This strain of the virus is usually responsible for a simple respiratory infection or fever. However, a small percentage display neurologic signs and are classified as Equine Herpes Myeloencephalopathy (EHM) cases. In March 2012 there has been an isolated case in San Diego and two at the same premises in Monterey County. It appears these horses may have been exposed while attending the big hunter/jumper show in Thermal, CA earlier in the month. Thankfully it has only been these three horses affected. Like a child going to a new school or off to summer camp, competitions will expose your horse to potential infections. Routinely we vaccinate for Rhinopneumonitis - EHV-1 and EHV-4, but the vaccines are only effective for a few months. This year, more than ever, if you are going to competitions and/or horse gatherings of any kind, I recommend vaccinating every three months with a flu/rhino combination. In addition, you should consider vaccinating with a special high load vaccine for EHV such as Pneumobort K. With this vaccine there will be more vaccine reactions, but that has to be weighed against the potential protective benefits.

Medication During Competition

Anti-inflammatory Medications: For all those who have taken an Advil or an aspirin to make it through a weekend of athletic activity, the concept of giving a horse an anti-inflammatory medication to help ease the aches that certainly occur over the course of a multi-day horse show will come as no surprise. The USEF allows the use of

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such medications on a limited basis. For 2012 only one such medication may be given. Right now I am recommending to clients that if they need to treat their horse, EQUIOXX should be the medication chosen. If used correctly, it can provide 24 hour anti-inflammatory effects vs. 12 hours for the other permitted medications. The key is that on day one it must be given at a triple dose. EQUIOXX has an additional benefit because it is a class of medications called COX-2 selective inhibitor. The other allowable medications such as bute and Banamine block both the COX-1 and COX-2 pathways. Blocking the COX-1 pathway increases the risk of side effects such as gastric ulcers, intestinal inflammation.

Heat Suppression

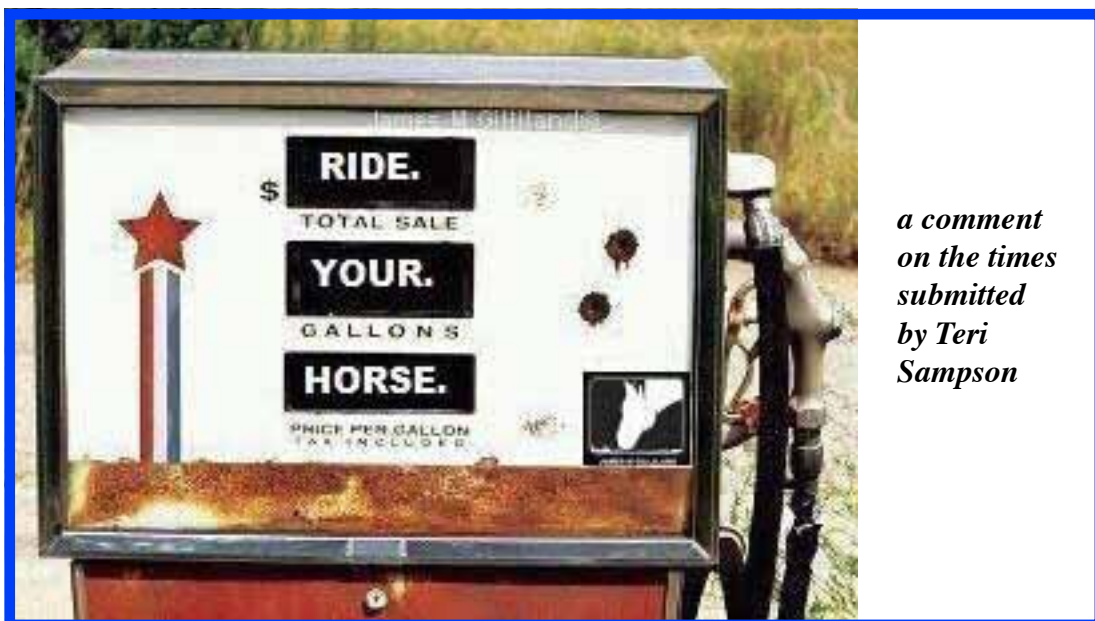
Another common issue is controlling the heat cycle in a mare. Great mares can be sidelined by their heat cycle. There is a new way to approach regulation of the heat cycle. The most reliable heat suppression medication is Regumate syrup. It has the drawback of having to be given every day to be effective and women need to be careful handling Regumate because it can be absorbed through the skin and affect their cycle. Now I am able to administer the active ingredient, altrenogest, formulated in a way that is effective for 30 days by a single injection. This is an alternative that be very attractive for many horse owners. There a several other methods to suppress heat, including placing a large sterile marble inside the uterus to fool the mare's reproductive tract.

Joint Therapy

Joint inflammation and joint disease represent at least 1/3 of all lameness issues in performance horses. It is very common for me to be asked to inject a horse's hocks prior to beginning the competition season. This procedure helps so many horses that consideration must be given to doing it prior to the start of your season for the serious performance horse. At the show, and staying within the USEF rules, I can provide a combination IV injection of pentosan, glucosamine and hylaronic acid. It appears to have significant physiological beneficial effects on horses with mild joint inflammation that is common for many if not most seasoned competitors.

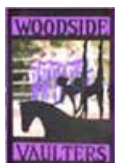
